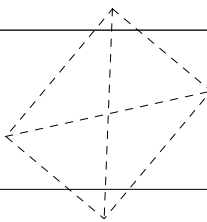


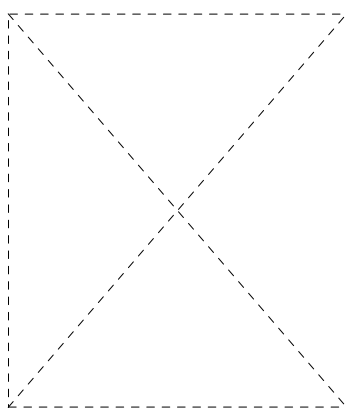

On my dresser at home there is a picture of four smiling children standing shoulder-to-shoulder squinting in the morning sun. It is the traditional first day of school photo that my mom always took of her children.

The four of us, my brothers, sister and I, are standing in front of

the house, next to the weeping cherry tree. Sally and I are wearing new dresses with matching sandals and my brothers have on new jeans and sneakers. All of us are hugging our collection of new notebooks, crayons, pencil cases, folders, and lunchboxes. In fact it looks as if my sister's collection of stuff is just about to fall out of her arms and onto the ground. But she seems oblivious to the cascading books. She is too caught up in the moment. In fact all four of us are caught up in the excitement of the moment. Our smiles are genuine. It is after all the first day of school.

Decades later I can look at that photo and still smell the newness of the dress and the crispness of the never-been-used notebook. And I can feel the butterflies in my stomach generated by the excitement of a new school year. There was something about the first day of school that created a contagious enthusiasm that made its way through the whole family. The new school year made us feel like anything was possible. Last year's bad grades, playground mishaps, and hurt feelings were on the other side of a long, long summer. This was another year, a whole new opportunity. The building and friends might be the same, but the teachers, classrooms, and subjects were new. And the exciting newness blended with the comfort of

the old created a fantastic environment of hope. There was just something about the first day of school.

Perhaps as school begins around us, at the college, the seminary and for our own children, we can catch a little of that enthusiasm. Like the kids at the bus stop we too can breathe in some excitement for new life. After all always with God there is the opportunity for new life. And this year at Prince of Peace we get to go back to school, too. In addition to the Sunday school program for children already established, we are offering two new education opportunities for adults. We will have a Bible Study on Thursday afternoons at 1pm and a Sunday Adult forum between the services at 9:15. I am excited about these classes and am hopeful that they will offer a means of growth and an avenue for strengthening our relationship with God. Together with the choir opportunities (for both adults and youth) these new adult education opportunities round out a full Sunday program at Prince of Peace. My hope is that the exciting newness will blend with the comfort of the old and create a fantastic environment of hope where we will discover anything is possible with Christ.

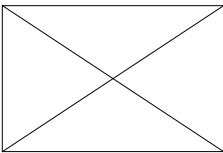

NEW THIS FALL



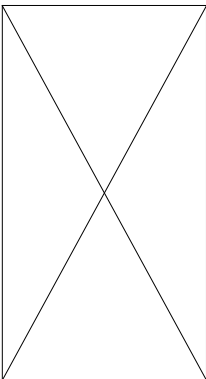

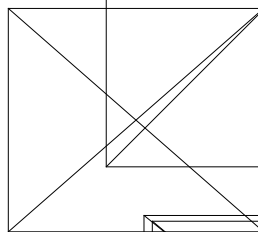
VESTRY ELECTIONS

If you would like to nominate someone for the Vestry, nomination forms will be available in the parlor on Sunday, September 23. Nominations will close at noon on Friday October 5. Elections will take place on Sunday, October 14.

According to our By-Laws, nominations shall be made by "baptized, registered communicants" of the church and "baptized, registered, communicant members" over the age of eighteen who "contribute to the support of the church" are eligible for election to the Vestry. Those eligible to vote shall also be "baptized, registered communicants" of Prince of Peace.

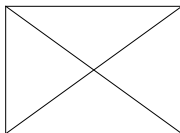

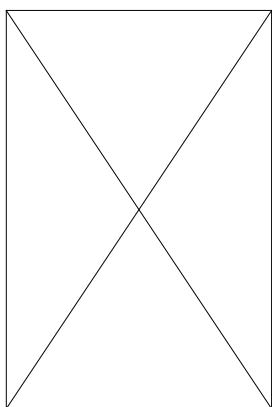
JUBILEE MINISTRY NEWS

We are tremendously grateful to our staff members Sylvia Asante, Kerry Schlein, Samantha Haun, Brian Cipporly, Anthony Keller, and Margie Smith and to the many volunteers who provided love,

guidance, teaching, and advocacy for our children. Some of the highlights of the 9-week program were learning how to knit with Neil Beach, painting flower pots and planting herbs with Laurie Storer, receiving backpacks loaded with school supplies furnished by Martha Schupp, learning good dental care from the

Tooth Fairy at Dr. Cleve Null's office (and receiving dental supplies, as well), and eating Rice Fruit apples which arrived weekly, thanks to the Rice-Townsend family and Keith Thomas.

In addition, Prince of Peace parishioners provided nutritious snacks, drinks, and paper products throughout the summer. A generous financial donation by parishioners covered the admission expenses for a visit to the Children's Museum on August 8. Bishop Ito expressed his gratitude and hopes that exchanges such as this will continue, which is our hope also.

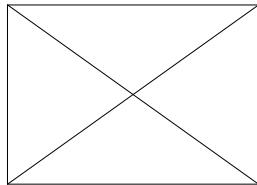

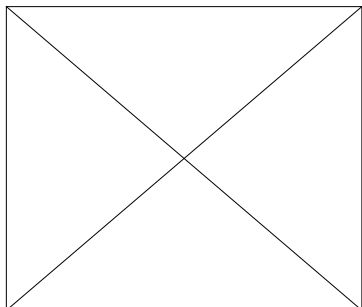

* John died March 22, 2007. He would have been 83 on July 10, 2007. He was a member of St. James Lutheran Church, but was baptized as an Episcopalian at Emmanuel Episcopal Church in WVA. He was a frequent visitor to Prince of Peace and attended many of the functions at POP and knew many of the POP people through Episcopalians. In fact, he thought about joining POP. When there was a call for a wood craftsman to make the Eucharist box, he answered the call and made a beautiful one and left a legacy at POP.

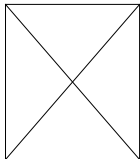

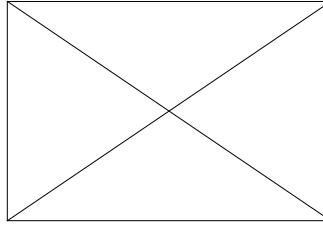
EPISCOPALS DINNERS

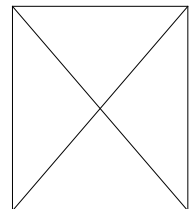
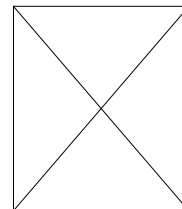
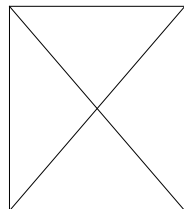

A LETTER FROM JILL PURDY

Dear Friends and Family,

In September I will begin a second year teaching 8th grade English at Stetson Middle School Philadelphia. It's a particularly under-resourced school with no working library and limited, outdated text resources in poor condition. As an English teacher, one of my biggest challenges last year was getting students to read (both in class and independently) simply because there weren't enough—or the right—books to encourage them to do so. Stetson also has next to no school supplies, which became a financial strain when I found myself spending a lot on paper, binders, and overheads, or trips to Kinkos.

During the school year I received an outpouring of donations and help from so many people who inspired me with their generosity and proved that it really is everywhere. Each donation was helpful and put to use, but I couldn't help but think how much more my kids could benefit if those who wanted to help knew exactly what my classroom needed most.

So...I have spent some time this summer putting together a wish list on amazon.com of the items (mostly books, some supplies) that would truly help my kids. *Please do not feel obligated to donate!* The purpose of this letter is to make it easier for those who might have done so anyway to know that they are contributing what is really needed.

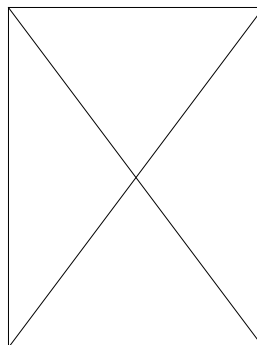

If you have never used one before, know that it lists each item, the number of copies I've requested, and how many of those copies have been bought already. You can sort the items by priority (among other things) if you want to see which books I think my kids would like most. Once you buy an item, it is shipped directly to me. Almost every book can be bought used, which means it can be purchased for virtually only the price of shipping.

Thank you so much for all of your support. It is really what has kept me from throwing in the towel many times this past year!

The timeline this autumn will be as follows:

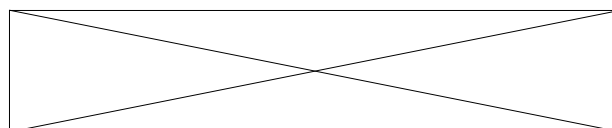
