


Now when John heard in prison about the things the Christ was doing, he sent word by his disciples to Jesus, asking, “Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?” Jesus responded, “Go, report to John what you hear and see. Those who were blind are able to see. Those who were crippled are walking. People with skin diseases are cleansed. Those who were deaf now hear. Those who were dead are raised up. The poor have good news proclaimed to them. Happy are those who don’t stumble and fall because of me.” (Matthew 11: 2-6)

“You do not become good by trying to be good, but by finding the goodness that is already within you and allowing that goodness to emerge.” (Eckhart Tolle, A New Earth: Awakening to Your Life’s purpose

I suggest that our theme for this year’s Advent is to intentionally center ourselves on what is present, pleasant or otherwise, what’s going on Now – at this moment! This intention is important for us because it is

quite easy to be swept away by anxiety associated with future needs and desires. Similarly, we may adversely connect to past failures and unmet expectations.

The hustling, consumptive pace of the Holiday Season stimulates these unhealthy neurological, psychological, and spiritual tendencies. Remaining grounded in the moment keeps us alert and attentive.

I mistakenly (?) used the example of preparing a Thanksgiving Dinner for a large group of people in my First Sunday of Advent homily. As it turned out, parishioners who mentioned that they experienced some discomfort for hosting a significant number of people deemed that the discomfort was good for them. They prepared for the meal, solicited help. They realized that they wanted the Thanksgiving experience to be a shared and joyous experience for everyone gathered around the table. I heard them say that the experience was “excellent” and “wonderful.” Uneasiness is good as it indicates that we care. We’re attending to what is happening now and taking action upon it.

I perceive that the 3rd Sunday of Advent’s Gospel (as noted in this article’s opening) offers insight on John’s dismay. Jesus of Nazareth is not achieving John’s expectations. Jesus is not inbreaking God’s Reign of Righteousness through repentance and divine power. Moreover, John has literally placed his faithful life on the line for God. He is imprisoned in a dark, lonely, and painful prison cell in and beyond the building’s walls. No wonder he is disappointed. Yet, his frustration evidences his faithfulness. He perhaps doesn’t comprehend what the Messiah’s true Reign as Christ will become. Christ “now” establishes a reign overthrowing injustices, comforting the suffering, and establishing global compassion rather than conflict.

Both John the Baptist and/ Jesus of Nazareth, lived out their faithful, courageous mortal lives from moment to moment. Did they experience nervousness. Indeed! We read such words expressed out of John’s mouth in this passage. We will hear Jesus

offer similar uncertainty while he is alone in the Garden of Gethsemane. Eckhart Tolle would likely say that both Jesus and John allowed goodness to emerge. Their courage has profoundly reshaped and recreated the world that they lived in 2,000 years ago. Their examples shape our world too.

Thus, I return to the notion of being present – now. If we, like John the Baptist, are disappointed in how God is showing up in the world perhaps we, like him, need to reconsider what Christ’s Reign is and how we live into it.



Fred Rogers: Look for the Helpers

Fred Rogers (Mr. Roger’s neighborhood) articulated the need for us to “[look for the helpers](#).” Where are Jesus’ gifts of healing being offered? Are we there? Are we – like Jesus’ and John the Baptist’s disciples witnessing such sacrificial examples of Emmanuel’s loving Gospel. Prince of Peace is especially able to help ... and does. A question for our continued consideration is, what (additional) help may our neighbors seek, whoever they may be? What’s our “brand” of Christianity? Are we able to courageously connect with God’s people as John the Baptist and Jesus the Christ did in their communities and broader creation. Blessings along The Way, Jim+
